What a Year!
We celebrated our 20th year in grand style, highlighted by our unforgettable Gala at the Residence of the German Ambassador the Hon. Peter Wittig and his wife the Hon. Humberta von Voss-Wittig.

Chaired by Cecilia Amtmann Schultz, we honored Maestro Philippe Auguin, who accepted the Society's highest honor, the Wagner Award, presented to artists and musicologists who have made important contributions to the study and enjoyment of Wagner's music. The Gala sold out, with 80 members and friends raising over \$45,000 toward our underlying mission: the identification and support of young Wagnerian singers.

We have planned an eventful 2019, commencing with the September 30 **Jeffrey Swann** recital. We have planned lectures by prominent scholars and musicians, the 19th annual Wagner in der Wildnis retreat, and the American Wagner Project concert.

In addition to our support for **Delora Zajick's** Institute for Young Dramatic Voices and Luana DeVol's American Wagner Project (AWP), Luana and Delora are returning to Washington in December to lead a Master Class—a throw back to how we conducted the Emerging Singers Program from 1999 to 2014. With the Swedish Embassy we are planning to commemorate the 100th birthday of the greatest of modern Brünnhildes, soprano Birgit Nilsson. Through John J. Pohanka and John Edward Niles we have initiated talks with the Miami Music Festival's Wagner Institute to expand opportunities for our young singers.

Sunday September 30. Jeffrey Swann, renowned international pianist, opens the Society's 21st year with a concert celebrating The Intimate Side of Wagner. Selections include Liszt's "Harmonies poetiques et religieuses," "Annees de pelerinage," and Mephisto Waltz; Berg's Sonata No. 1, and Debussy's Arabesques and "L'isle joyeuse."

October 18. Isolde's Dream: Mathilde Wesendonck. French-American author Judith Cabaud calls on a host of heretofore undiscovered resources to tell the fascinating story of Wagner's muse and platonic paramour. Cabaud, a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of NYU, holds a licence es lettres from the Sorbonne. In the New York Wagner Society newsletter Katherine Kolb wrote "Cabaud has written this

book to right the balance" created when Cosima destroyed all but fourteen of Mathilde's letters, 7:30, Goethe Institut.

November 8. Maestro Saul Lilienstein discusses Wagner's Sonic Explorations. Young Wagner learned from Beethoven and Weber, but from Lohengrin on there were no models to follow and his fertile imagination took over. With each successive opera he created the state of the art, influencing every major composer of his time and into the 20th century. Maestro Lilienstein will trace the progression of Wagner's orchestral




inventions from his youthful symphonies and overtures through all the great works which followed. 7:30 Goethe Institut.


The Society presented Maestro Philippe Auguin with the Wagner Award, awarded to individuals who have made extraordinary contributions to the study and enjoyment of Wagner's art. We honor Maestro Auguin's notable tenure as Washington National Opera Music Director and his superb work conducting the 2016 WNO Ring.

About Mr. Auguin the Post's Philip Kennicott wrote "Auguin is the hero of the Washington Ring, and it was very satisfying to see him, and the orchestra, rewarded with enthusiastic applause before every act, and lustily after the last curtain." The Post's principal music critic Anne Midgette wrote "Philippe Auguin got things out of the Kennedy Center Orchestra that I didn't think anybody knew could be gotten.... Auguin is one of today's best Wagner conductors."

He studied conducting in Vienna and Florence, and served as assistant conductor under both Herbert von Karajan and Sir George Solti. He brought the Ring to the International Beijing Music Festival in 2005. Besides Wagner, he conducts Bruckner, Strauss, Stravinsky and Bartok. He has recorded the complete symphonic works of Gustav Mahler.

Maestro Auguin is the 15th recipient of the Society's highest honor. Other notables include Donald Crosby, Placido Domingo, Evelyn Lear, Saul Lilienstein, James Morris, Jay Hunter Morris, John J. Pohanka, Thomas Stewart, Jeffrey Swann, Jennifer Wilson and Francesca Zambello.

The American Wagner Project of 2018 By John Edward Niles



Founded in 2013 as a partnership between the Wagner Society of Washington DC and Delora Zajick's Institute for Young Dramatic Voices, the American Wagner Project identifies and nurtures large and dramatic voices, the kind of voices not generally sought by conservatories but necessary for the big operas of Wagner, Strauss, and Verdi. The AWP is a successor to

the Thomas Stewart and Evelyn Lear Emerging Singers Program, which we established in 2000 to guide these unique talents to the world's opera stages. Participants are selected by **Delora Zajick, Luana DeVol,** and the Society's **John Edward Niles** through national auditions. This year from July 9 to July 28 at the University of Nevada Reno each participant selected one or two roles from a Wagner opera and received intensive coaching in voice, German diction, movement, and acting.

Tuition is free except for first year singers. However, living expenses and travel are not provided and all singers depend on their own resources, sponsors or grants.

The Society is the Institute's largest single source of funding. This year we spent over \$35,000 on the AWP including a \$15,000 block

grant, \$10,000 in grants to individual singers, and costs associated with auditions and the recital at the Swiss embassy. We awarded **Eugene (Trey) Richards** \$5,000 to cover his trip to the Melchoir competition in Denmark and to audition for European opera companies. We awarded \$5,000 to **Isaachah Savage** who in 2018 covered the role of Lohengrin for the Chicago Lyric Opera.

Participants who have gone on to major careers include Jay Hunter Morris (2001), Daniel Brenna (2005), Jennifer Wilson (2001, 2004), Rebecca Teem (2007), Issachah Savage (2012-13), and Soloman Howard (2015)

Amber Opheim is a soprano who completed a Masters in vocal performance from Chicago's DePaul University. She holds a fest position at Konzert Theater Bern Switzerland. At AWP she is learning the role of Sieglinde. She can be seen on YouTube.

Roman Lalcic is a bass-baritone from the Republic of Moldova. With AWP he is studying the role of Wotan. Mezzo soprano Jillian Yemen, in her second year with AWP, is studying the role of Erda in both *Das Rheingold* and *Götterdämmerung*. Eugene (Trey) Richards, in



his third year, is preparing Wotan/the Wanderer. Besides the Melchior competition and auditions at German companies, he retained an agent who is arranging auditions such as Wotan in Pforzheim's upcoming *Das Rheingold*.



Elizabeth Baldwin, an Ohio native, was praised as "ferociously talented" by the San Francisco Examiner. She has participated in the San Francisco Opera's Merola program and was a National Semi-finalist in the Met's National Council Auditions. She recently sang Sieglinde

with Miami Music Festival's Wagner Institute.

We anticipate four participants: Amber Opheim, Roman Lalcic, and Elizabeth Baldwin all participated in the 2018 AWP summer institute. They will be joined by soprano **Alexandria Shiner**, who joined the Washington National Opera's Domingo-Cafritz Young Artist program

in 2017. Last season she sang the title role in the Domingo-Cafritz production of *Alcina*, and Berta in *The Barber of Seville*.

2019 Wildnis will be June 14-16 at Capacon. The topic will be **Wagner and Modern Culture**. Jeffrey and Simon will explore Wagner's influence on literature, art, dance and music. Jeffrey suggests some preparatory reading: Proust *In Search of*

Lost Time, specifically Overture and Swann in Love; Thomas Mann's Death in Venice, Blood of the Walsungs, Tristan and the essay "Greatness and Suffering of Richard Wagner." He also suggests any book on the Symbolists, the Belle Epoque, and Hart's Structure and Motif in Finnegan's Wake. Wildnis 2020 will be June 5-7.


